It is a great pleasure to announce that **Jim Halvorson** has been selected as the new director for the Silver Statesmen chorus.

Jim's experience and ability to connect with every member of the chorus was very much in evidence during the audition process. We also want to thank BJ Hill and Bob Hartley for giving us two more great evenings of barbershop singing while providing the selection committee and the chorus a wonderful opportunity to see three fine directors at work.

By way of background, Jim currently holds a B.A. in Vocal Music Education from St. Olaf College in Northfield, MN, with graduate coursework in Music Ed. from UNLV. He taught elementary general music for 11 years (one year in MN, and 10 years in Las Vegas). Jim currently serves as the director of the choral program at Cheyenne High School, where he oversees four choirs enrolling about 150 students.

Jim has been a barbershopper for most of his life. He joined the BHS on May 30, 1983, with the Minneapolis Commodores at the tender age of 10. He sang and competed with the Commodes from 1983 to 1986. In 1986, Jim became a charter member of the Great Northern Union chorus and sang with them from 1986-1998. He moved to Las Vegas in 1998 and became a charter member (and musical director) of the City of Lights chorus from 1998 until 2003. In 2005, he took over as the musical director of the Celebrity City chorus of Sweet Adelines International. He served as the director from 2005-2011.

Jim currently sings in the quartet, 95 North, which is the 2012 Far Western District champions. He is also currently serving as the Chairman of Youth in Harmony for the Far Western District.

Congratulations on your selection, Jim. We are proud to welcome you aboard and look forward to many years of fun and barbershop harmony!

Our star-studded legacy is validated by two venerable parent choruses – Las Vegas' 52-year-old *Gamble-Aires* and Metro's 14-year-old *City of Lights*. Both choruses are fondly remembered by past and present local barbershoppers and thousands of Las Vegas valley fans who, for decades, loyally supported both Chapters and member quartets.


The debut rehearsal of the new Silver Statesmen on Jan. 3, at our new site (see below) attracted 74 gentlemen seeking fun and quality barbershopping. None of us knew what to expect!

The sounds on "opening night" and at the following three rehearsals surprised skeptics and awed believers with music that raised goose bumps and confirmed expectations. Attendees (members, past members and guests) were not disappointed!

Chapter President Steve Salmon welcomed enthusiastic first-night members. Music & Performance VP/Acting Director, Albert Weiss, worked the chorus in preparation for our upcoming Spring Show (date and location to be determined). He introduced Celebrate Harmony, Joe Liles' upbeat centerpiece tune for the Society's suggested 75th Anniversary show package, which the Silver Statesmen will be performing.

A near-overflow afterglow at a nearby Irish pub was incredible as soaring spirits sparked swirling overtones and nurtured new camaraderies.

Treasury Notes

The past few months have been a busy time for your Treasurer. Many things had to be addressed due to the merger of our two chapters.

First, the Treasurers of both chapters had to collect any outstanding money owed to their chapter and pay any outstanding bills. An audit of both chapters' books was made and submitted to BHS in Nashville. Income tax for both chapters was filed and a copy sent to BHS.

A list of officers of the new chapter, along with the yearly corporate filing fee, was sent to the Secretary of State.

The Las Vegas Metro Corporation was dissolved and a fee paid to the Secretary of State. The charter for the Las Vegas Metro Chapter was surrendered to BHS.

It was agreed upon that, due to logistics, we would use Bank of America for the chapter banking. After several trips to the bank, it was discovered that we couldn't simply change the name of the City of Lights account, but would have to open a new account due to different tax ID numbers. It was then necessary to produce the original charter and other papers from the Gamble-Aires and give them to the bank. The Secretary, Ivan Lambert, and I spent several hours at the bank going over the paperwork before we finally got the account opened. It was then necessary to transfer enough money from the City of Lights account to fund the new account. Then, we discovered that we could not accept checks made out to our new "Silver Statesmen" name without filing for a DBA or fictitious name with the County. In the meantime, Dave Kennedy closed the Gamble-Aires account with Chase Bank and had a cashiers check made out to Silver Statesmen Chorus. The bank would not accept the check for deposit until they had proof that a fictitious name had been filed with the County. We then paid a fee and applied for a fictitious name. The Secretary and I then had to go back to the bank and fill out more paperwork and signature cards to add Silver Statesmen to our account name. With this work completed, it was then possible to deposit the Gamble-Aires check and transfer the rest of the money from City of Lights and close that account.

After combining our treasuries, we ended up with about \$6,000 to start the new year with our new chapter. This sounds like a fair amount of money, but after we had our Installation Banquet, we were left with about \$5,000. We have some major expenditures coming up with an annual insurance bill, purchase of new music, and other things to set up the new chapter too numerous to mention.

In the days to come, it will be up to ALL of us to find ways to generate revenue to run our chapter. Our Singing Valentine program netted us about \$1,600, but a couple of music orders will eat that up in no time. I look forward to a very fruitful and profitable year along with the joy of singing in a GREAT new chorus.

We only need a few more members to be a 100 man chorus!! WE CAN DO IT!!


A GREAT BEGINNING



Performances come off without a hitch because the chorus manager has communicated clearly and planned everything well in advance. And the chorus is well dressed because he has put together, designed, ordered, and fit the apparel needed for the chorus to look sharp; this also means the possibility of applying makeup occasionally for contests and performances.

Our Chorus Manager this year is Ross Marty (with the help of his wife, Ann, two sons, Thomas and Justin, both 18, and two daughters, Alicia, 22, and Amanda, 20). So far this year, Ross has secured our meeting location, and with the help of his family, provides us with refreshments at the break. Ross is in the process of putting together our uniforms, both Class A and Class B and with the help of others we are well on the way to booking show dates for the remainder of the year, not to mention preparing for our attendance at the upcoming division competition in Ontario, California.

Ross's unique, hands-on, problem-solving experiences growing up on the family farm in Minnesota took root at an early age. At the age of 17 he volunteered for the Air Force. After basic training, he served at two other installations before being assigned to Nellis AFB to a unit that handled a variety of jobs requiring finesse, planning and special organizational skills.

Folks are advised, with a wink, not to "mess" with Ross. He's one of the happiest, smileyist folks around, but he's also one of the most highly trained survivalists to be reckoned with, besides the training he received in the military, Ross also has a Second Degree Black Belt in Taekwondo, and many other degrees in other martial arts to include Krav Maga and Jiu-Jitsu and Ross is also an instructor as well. Ross helped train Ann and all three of his children to be First Degree Black Belts as well. "Growing up with four sisters also taught me some survival tricks," he quipped.

Severe and permanent service-related spinal injuries have forced him to use a wheelchair with considerable dexterity. "I hold no grudges against anyone," he explained. "I try to keep a stiff upper lip about my injuries and it's something I just need to live with."

When asked if he still was a "formidable force" to be reckoned with, he smiled and quietly answered "absolutely." Ross left active duty in 1993. Ross, 44, a man of deep Christian faith, has been married to his wife, Ann, for 25 years;

He's been a musician since childhood. His musical talents were nurtured at a young age with piano lessons and he later played the ivories while he and his sisters sang. "I also learned to play the guitar, trumpet, drums and French horn," he said. "But I like singing best of all...particularly barbershop with its beautiful chords and overtones – and I sing every day." Richard Frank Cox

December 5, 1938 - March 17, 2013

To all of his fellow barbershoppers, he was and will always be **Dickie Cox.** If there was ever a person who wanted to heal all the wrongs in the world, it was Dickie. He was an idealist who sought to bring harmony to those around him. Even though he was enthusiastic and generous, it was sometimes difficult for him to boast about his accomplishments. Dickie had strong personal convictions, making it hard for him to relinquish those ideals he held dearest to himself. Despite his outer strengths and beliefs, he sometimes struggled in his efforts to see the world as completely positive. Dickie's life motto was always to hope for the best and work hard towards that end, but be prepared for some of life's disappointments. This philosophy was a continual driving force in his life, but it did not extinguish the bright light that defined the dreamer

in him, something that was always there and that he readily shared with everyone around him.

Dickie was born and raised in Ohio. He was a compassionate person, a quality that he would carry with him throughout his life. Dickie was a caring, diplomatic man and was tolerant of the feelings of those around him. As a young man, he sang in the school choir and ran on the track and field team. He graduated from High School in 1957.

A great father and influence on his family, Dickie was married to his wife, Jackie, for nearly 30 years before she passed away in November of 2006.

Our friend, Dickie Cox, was a Navy veteran. He served his country from 1958—1962 and two more years in the reserves until 1964. For those of us who sang with Dickie, it was quickly apparent that he had a great ear and it was always a challenge to get him not to cringe when he heard a note out of tune. Dickie was always full of stories and loved to share his times in the Navy and recall past barbershop events and the fun times we had together.

Dickie passed away on March 17, 2013 at Centennial Hills Hospital in Las Vegas, NV from heart and respiratory distress. He is survived by his son Rick, daughter-in-law Tristy, grandson Jorie, granddaughter Kira, his sister Carol and his niece Susan. He has been laid to rest in Southern Nevada Veterans Memorial Cemetery.
